What Has CIMPA Done?

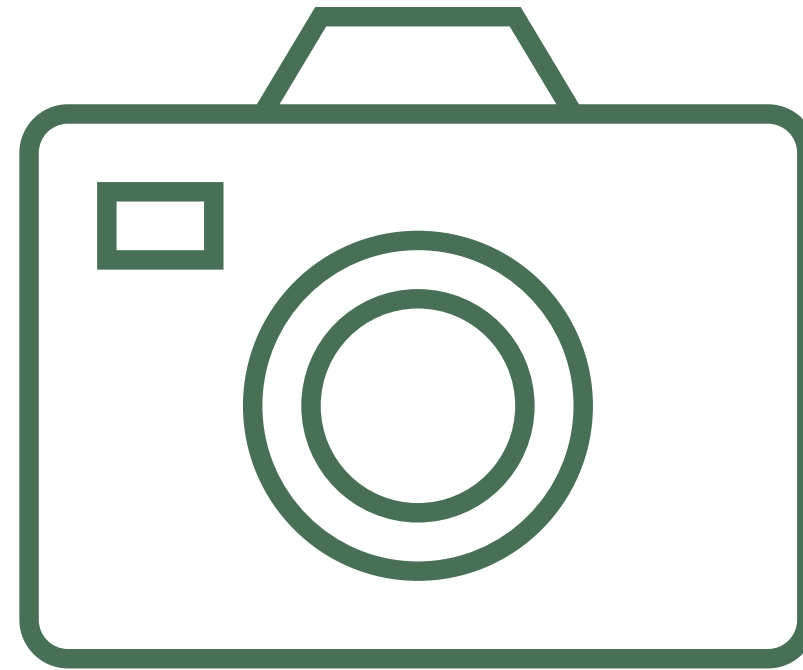
Accomplishments

- Published 5 Conference research proceedings and one book
- Supported health, school tuition, and water projects in Africa and Haiti

Not Just Another International Conference!

The International Conference on Public Management and Development Administration was precipitated by the struggle against apartheid in South Africa. In a strange way, this oppressive system inspired public service professionals in various countries on several continents to work cooperatively to enhance the provision of public goods and services.

Prior to the first all-race elections in South Africa, concern was raised that the oppressive practices of apartheid might have limited the capacity of Africans to manage the emerging affairs of their multi-ethnic nation. To address this concern a series of initiatives were undertaken, including those by the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs (GSPIA) at the University of Pittsburgh and the Kennedy School at Harvard University. The GSPIA initiative involved an official from The Conference of Minority Public Administrators. The Kennedy School initiative involved a collaborative arrangement with Southern University.

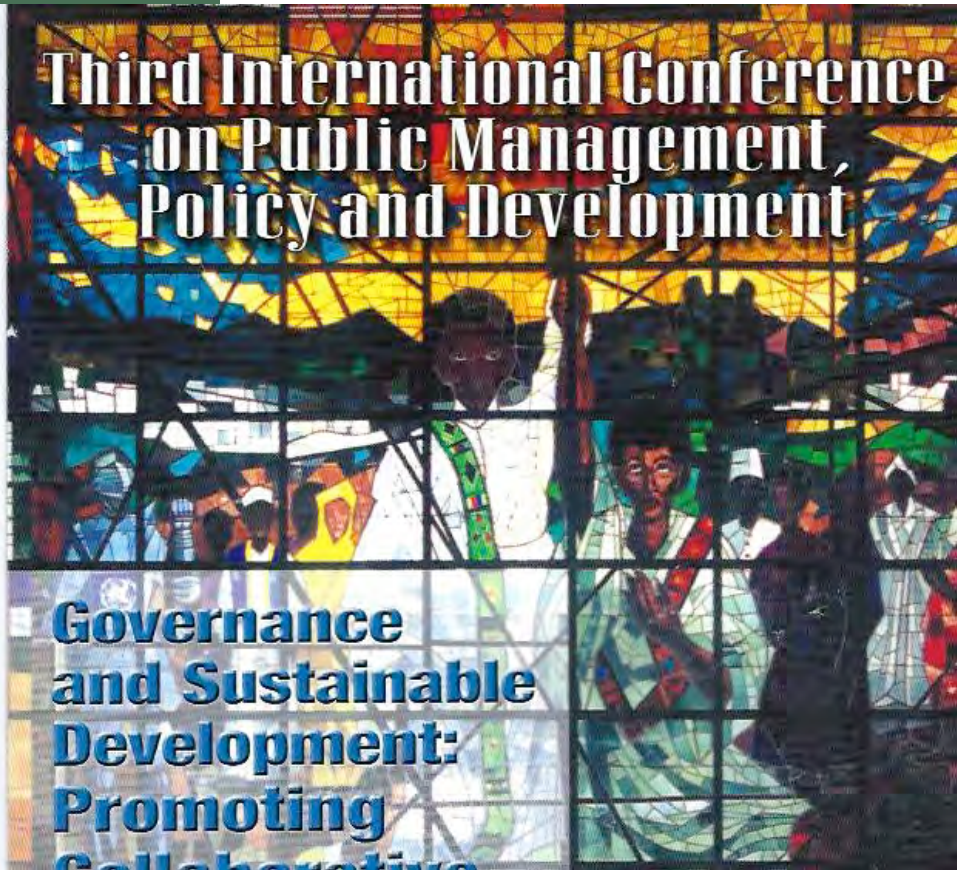
Following the all-race election in South Africa, the National Forum of Black Public Administrators also initiated a program in public management including training and mentoring, support for historically disadvantaged institutions, and study-abroad programs. These initiatives focused on enhancing the capacity of Africans, disadvantaged by policies and practices of apartheid, to better manage the affairs of state. In a January 1994 meeting at the University of Botswana (now the University of the North West), a consensus among the participants in the capacity building project emerged for the need to build linkages between South African and American public service professionals. The Conference of Minority Public Administrators (COMPA) was asked to be a facilitator for building these linkages, and contacts were made with numerous public service organizations.

The first planning meeting for the conference was held at Southern University in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. In addition to the nine American public service institutions and organizations, representatives from Ethiopia, Ghana, Nigeria, Mali, Morocco and South Africa were also present at the first planning meeting. Subsequent planning meetings were held in Washington, D.C., Pittsburgh (U.S.A.), and Pretoria, Durban and Capetown (South Africa).

The theme of the First International Conference, convened August 4 through 7, 1997, in Johannesburg, South Africa, was "Transforming and Revitalizing Public Management and Development Through Institutional Capacity Building and Governance: A Program for Action." Joining COMPA in convening the conference on Public Management and Development Administration were Southern University, the National Forum of Black Public Administrators and the King-Luthuli Transformation Centre. Generous support was also provided for the conference by a variety of public service and business organizations.

More than 150 individuals, representing eleven African countries, Great Britain, India, and the United States, participated in the first conference. Although the historical legacy of apartheid inspired these participants to convene in South Africa, this abhorrent system of oppression did

Africa: The Youthful Continent

- More than 65% of Africa's population is under age 35
- Over 35% is between the age 15 and 35
- About 10 million African youth arrive on the labor market annually
- In 2050, it is predicted that Africa will account for:
 - 41% of the world's births
 - 40% of all children under 5
 - 37% of all children under 18
 - 35% of the world's adolescents

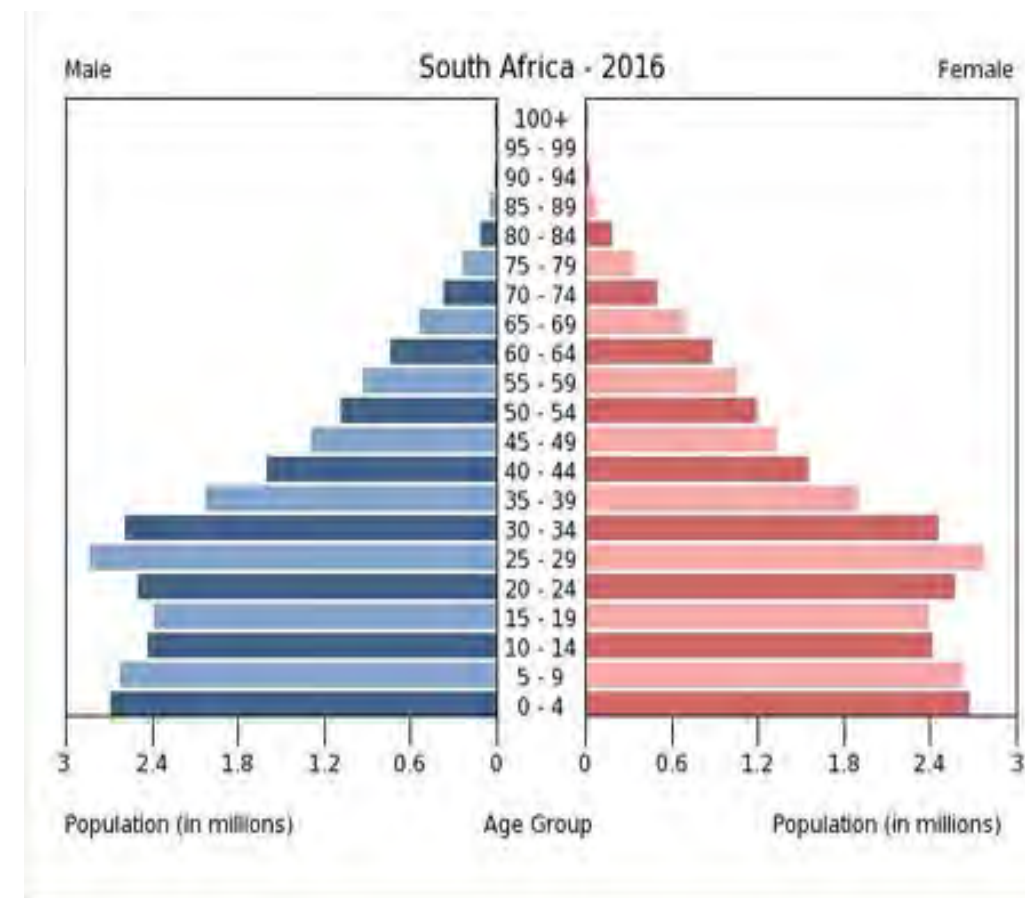
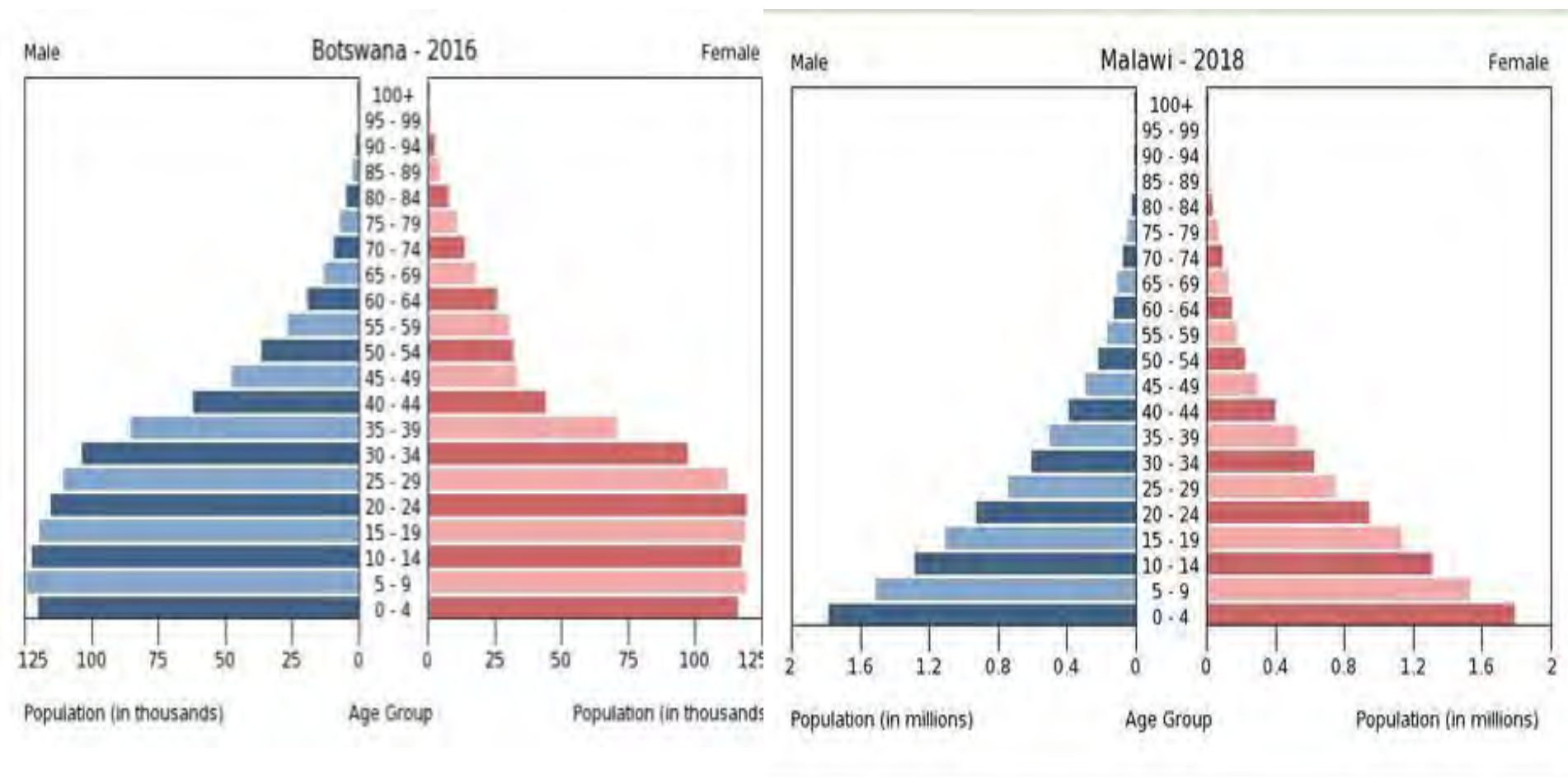

- The Angolan government is taking charge in addressing the needs and aspirations of its youngest citizens

The Angola 10-Year Higher Education Program and Satellite Campus Initiative:

- leverages visiting scholars and professor sabbaticals as key components of an educational diplomacy strategy.

- Transformation of Africa's Youth Bulge Through Entrepreneurship
- Economic Diplomacy: preparing youth for skilled talent pools and encouraging entrepreneurship in critical sectors.
- Talent Retention: Create programs that provide compelling reasons for young professionals to remain and contribute locally.

Proposing 15 ANCHOR PROGRAMS AND CURRICULA FOR PARTNERSHIPS WITH ANGOLAN COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES:

1. L INCUBATOR: Lincoln University & ISPTEC for business incubation and acceleration, specializing in geology for mining and critical minerals graduate degrees.
2. Florida A&M Cybersecurity satellite programs and partnerships : FAMU & ISPTEC focusing on cybersecurity research, critical infrastructure protection, and NSA training.
3. Morgan State University's ISPTEC initiative :engineering, computer science, business, and architecture, aiming to train tech workers and engineers for infrastructure projects.
4. Tuskegee University: Tuskegee & ISPTEC as a critical engineering and veterinary anchor, contributing to processing plant design, disease prevention, and food production.
5. Delaware State University: DSU & UPRA focusing on biology, aquaculture, and neuroscience, training technicians for health data management.
6. Pan-African Studies Program with Ethiopian Partnership and Angolan Educational Diplomacy, focusing on Pan-African diplomacy, peace, and security.
7. Psychology, Afrocentric Identity and Human Development—Dr. DeAnne Burney, (FAMU)
8. The Global Leaders Ethical Training Institute (GLETI) for ethical leadership development.
9. CIMPAD: Consortium of HBCUs serving as an anchor program leveraging its experience in partnering with Historically Disadvantaged Institutions (HDIs) in Africa.
10. PALED #1: Reconciliation, Peace, and Human Security Academic Program, chaired by Minister Tete António- research policies in international affairs and human security.
11. PALED #2: Lobito Corridor Agriculture and Food Systems focused on enhancing Africa's food security through sustainable agricultural practices.
12. PALED #3: Africa Blue Ocean Economy and Aquaculture: Leveraging Africa's coastline for policy development and food security.
13. PALED #4: Medicine, STEM, and Innovation Academic Program: addressing healthcare challenges and fostering regional collaboration in medical science, STEM, and innovation.
14. PALED #5: African Villages on Native American Land: historical and cultural connections and the legacy of the transatlantic slave trade.
15. PALED #6: Implementing UN General Assembly Resolution A/80/L.48, exploring reparative justice.

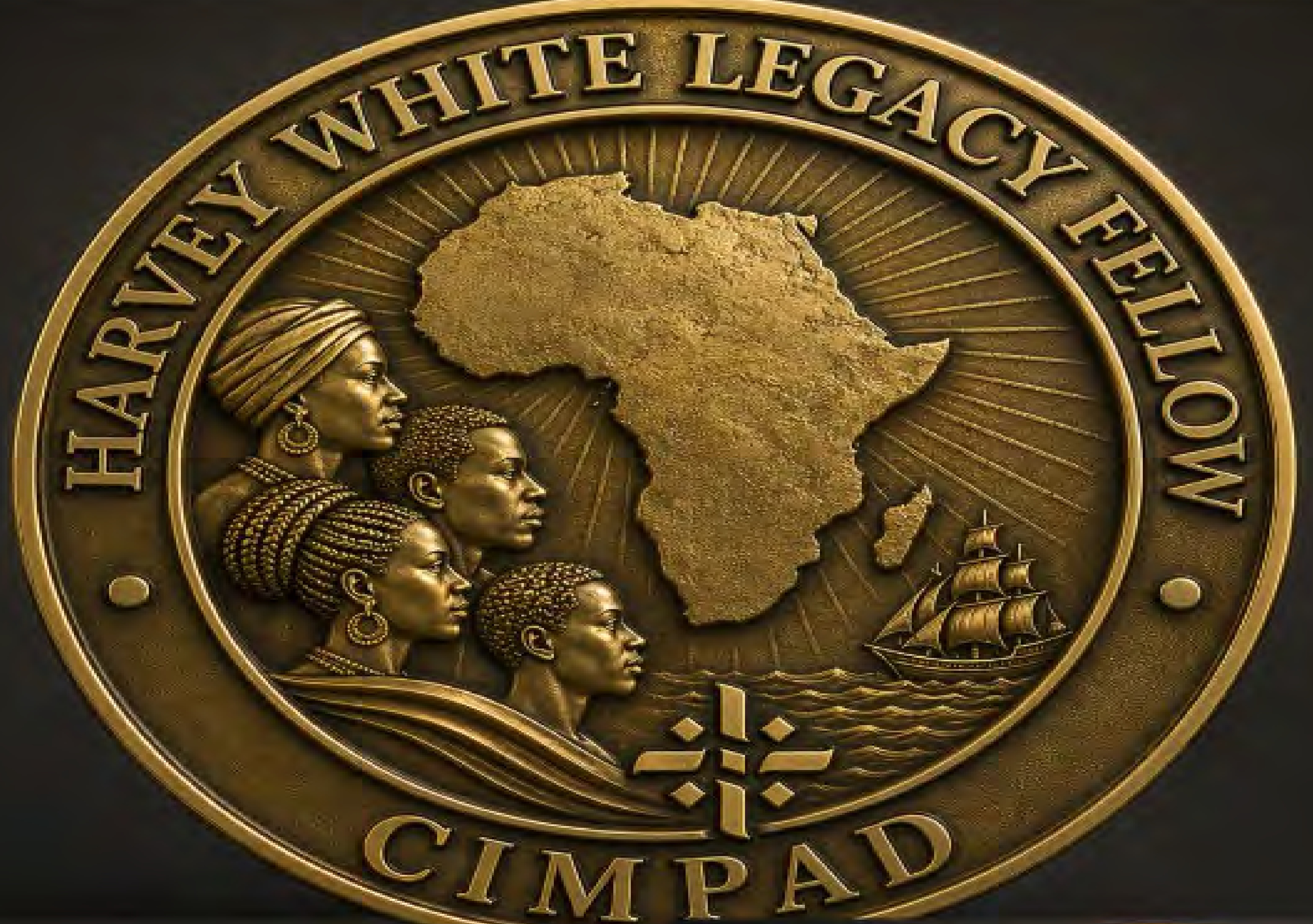
